- II. Updates from Undergraduate Council Committees and Chairs- Dr. William Benner
 - a. Course Proposal Committee- Dr. Ana Louise Keating
 - i. Notifications: These are new courses History 1013 and History 1023.
 - 1. HIST 1013-History of the United States, 1492-1865

 - 1. Bachelor of Music in Music (Musical Theatre)
 - a. Comments/Questions: This program includes theater, dance, and music courses. There are ways that the school of arts and design, including visual arts, fashion design, and merchandising, can participate in this degree plan. It is projected to increase enrollment. The National Association of Schools of Music will accredit it. What is great about it and is surprising is that UNT does not have a degree like this. We have a few questions: Resources in place and how they will be used to support the program? Curious about projected enrollment? The program does not suggest adding new faculty, and we want to clarify why new faculty was not necessary? With the questions being answered today, the sub-committee does approve the program.

<u>Pam Youngblood</u>: Dr. Danielle Woolery that developed this proposed is on the zoom today but I wanted to say a couple of things: We are very excited about this program. Yes, we did not ask for new faculty because we are



drawing on the resources that are already in existence within the school and we anticipate of bringing in quest from the industry like directing, that will prepare our students to go out and work in the industry and there are so many different ways that they can do that. One of the big motivators is that so many deserving students have not had the advantages of private lessons in music, dance, or other things. There are so few spots in the musical theater programs across the country, and there is a whole big group of people, that tends to describe our demographics, this will give them a chance as there is so much talent everywhere, and we want to help nurture that talent. We have a new staff member, an artistic manager for musical theater, and he has many connections in the industry and with fundraising. We have a realistic approach and we will see huge benefits with this program.

<u>Danielle Woolery</u>: Our goal for next year to is to have a cohort of 24 students as we have garnered a lot of interest and have potential students that have submitted prescreening materials to be considered. Our new artistic manager has been out giving professional development at local area isd's and is out in the community promoting TWU's hopefully newest program in the fall. We have no more than 19 new credit hours, and most are classes that we already offer, we are just capitalizing on the growth and we are excited about the collaboration potential with-in the school.

Dr. Burkett: You mentioned that the cohort for this fall would be 24, and in music, there is not that large of a cohort; how would you meet that enrollment projection? Dr. Youngblood: We do have some large cohorts in music, about 80 in music education students and about 150 in music therapy students. We will need funding, and I have already identified funding for an adjunct to come in and teach the additional voice lessons. Everything else they will need to take in the first year already exists. It is possible that there will need to be an additional section added, but our Dean is already aware of it and has approved it. I also wanted to add something about the person we hired to be the artistic manager because, for ten years, he was with Dallas Summer Musicals and developed their high school awards programs, which became the second largest in the country of its type. He has all these connections with area



high schools and theater program teachers. This came about when I mentioned this to the Dean and we were looking for ways that the entire school can participate in and I am thrilled at how it captured the attention of our Interim Provost. Others have said he is giddy when discussing this new program. Therefore, we are not evasive when it comes to the size of the cohort because we do have a few larger cohorts. There are big interest in the juniors at the high school level and we became more aware when Music hosted the "College Prep Audition Weekend". There were about 90 students that came from all over the country to develop their college audition and this is when we saw the need for this type of program.

There was at one point when the provost at UNT wanted a music theater program, but the college of music did not want one and passed on the opportunity.
