Chicago Style: Multiple Authors & Citations

- Chicago Manual of Style format citations can follow two methods: author-date and notes-bibliography.
- Author-Date: Sources cited with parentheses including author last name and publication year like APA and ends with a reference list.
- Notes-Bibliography: Sources cited with superscripts that correspond to a footnote on the page and ends with a bibliography.
- For author-date citations, place a sentence's end punctuation (generally a period in academic writing) AFTER the citation at the end of a sentence. For notes-bibliography citations, place the end punctuation BEFORE the superscript.
- For both methods: in-text citations for sources with up to three authors will use "and," not an ampersand, "&." Beyond three authors, cite the first author followed by "et al.".

Examples of In-Text Citations

Author-Date:

Type of Citation	Citation in body of paragraph	Parenthetical Format
One work by one author	Gullion states (109).	(Gullion 2020, 109).
One work by up to three authors	Gullion, Smith, and Tilton state (50).	(Gullion, Smith, and Tilton 2020, 50).
One work by four or more authors	Gullion et al. state (50).	(Gullion et al. 2020, 13).
