Writing Thesis Statements

What is a thesis statement?

• A sentence or two (generally in the introduction of the paper) that establishes the main argument, analysis, or rhetorical purpose of the paper.

Why are thesis statements important?

- condenses the argument for the reader
- clarifies the organization of the paper
- acts as a "guide" for the rest of the paper

How to write a strong thesis statement:

- 1. Determine the purpose of the paper:
 - o **analytical**: breaks down an issue or idea into component parts, evaluates these parts, and presents the breakdown and evaluation to an audience
 - o expository: explains something to the audience
 - argumentative: makes a justifiable claim and tries to convince the audience that the claim is true through evidence-based arguments

2. Answers a question:

- What is the subject you are writing about (what is it and why are you writing about it)?
- What is the main idea of the paper (what are you focusing on)?
- What is the purpose of the paper?

Strong Thesis	Weak Thesis
asserts a specific and focused claim that can be supported with evidence types of evidence: research studies, statistics, textual or experiential examples, and/or anecdotal evidence	unclear about main point, subjective, and/or vague
"In <i>The Tempest</i> , Caliban represents the 'Other,' Miranda and Ferdinand represent the restoration of the social order, and Prospero represents literary creativity."	"The Tempest is a great play with a lot of symbolism."
